

6 Steps to a Trouble Free Playground

It is very common these days for me to hear great praise from substitute noon hour supervisors that it is a pleasure to supervise our students at recess. They comment often that our students' capacity to be self-directed, friendly and inclusive is remarkable.

Recess is to have fun, make friends and get exercise. That is our motto at Burns Park. In order to help our

students keep active while having fun and playing with friends, we teach them how to play games from the book, *Games Kids Should Play at Recess* by Dr. Hinson. Dr. Hinson used his expertise as a PE educator to create developmentally appropriate variations on many of the popular sport games such as baseball, football, and soccer. These games are played in smaller groups and are designed so that all players are active and, without the help of coaches and referees, can quickly resolve conflicts.

In addition to these more traditional looking games, we teach lots of other games to encourage all kids to be active at recess. Whenever necessary, noon hour staff step into our children's discourse to help them redirect the game so they can go back to having fun, making friends and getting exercise. Our approach is proactive and is intended to stop conflicts before they become hurtful.

We do not allow games that could result in an injury, including games that involve tackling and other physical contact. Our use of flag belts eliminates the need for tackle football or pushing during a friendly game of tag.

Our children are learning as all children this age learn. Please feel free to call me if you have questions about the playground or about any incident or complaint from your child regarding the playground. If I don't know about it, I will investigate and get back to you.

Thanks for your support of our efforts to make recess a fun, friendly, active experience for everyone.

This renewal includes the district's operating millage (non-homestead and hold-harmless) and the sinking fund millage; this is simply a continuation of the taxes that you already pay, NOT a tax increase. If the millage proposals do not pass the AAPS will lose over 45% of their funding.

Burns Park School would like to give a big and warm thanks to the Ann Arbor District Library and their outreach program, co-ordinated by Mr. Ira Lax, for sending Mr. Glen Morningstar, contra dance caller, to run a three week residency entitled "Dance Your Way Through History". This three-part sequence taught our 3rd, 4th & 5th graders dances from the 1700's, 1800's, and 1900's while discussing Michigan history and innovations that influenced and changed dances through the centuries. We were lucky to have this residency last year for the 4th and 5th graders, and this year Mr. Lax granted us a second year with Mr. Morningstar and a unique opportunity: Mr. Morningstar worked for the first time with 3rd graders.
